

SEQUOYA ART MASTERPIECE

Frank Lloyd Wright Stained Glass

Individual Project

Materials: 5" x 6" Plexiglas (one for each student)
One large Plexiglas piece (for class project)
Stained Glass Paint
Leading Paint
Ziploc bag (contains hanging wire, toothpicks, paper & labels)

This project can be done in one or two sessions. If it's done in two sessions the children can go up to #2 the first session and then the leading will have a chance to dry before painting. It can be done in one day, but the kids need to be careful not to smear the leading paint while painting with the stained glass paint.

- 1) Have students trace the outline of the Plexiglas on a plain sheet of paper. Have them draw their stained glass design on the paper. You can let them design their own pattern or have a theme picked out. You could also give them directions like draw two circles and two horizontal lines and two vertical lines.
- 2) Take the protective paper off the Plexiglas. It has plastic on both sides. Put the paper under the Plexiglas and trace the design on the glass with the leading paint.
- 3) Paint inside the lines with the stained glass paint. Make sure the paint touches the leading lines. The toothpick can be used to help spread the paint. Please try and monitor the paint use. It doesn't have to be thick; it just has to cover the glass.
- 4) It takes about 8 hours for the paint to dry. You can have the kids attach the hanging wire before they start painting or it can be done afterwards. If it's done afterwards make sure the holes aren't painted over. There are labels included in the bag so that if you have the kids attached the wire you can attach a name label at the same time.
- 5) Please put the paint, leading and what's left of the stuff in the Ziploc back in the art masterpiece room. Thanks!

Class Project

This project will be a class project that will be raffled off at Art Walk. Each glass is going to make a large stained glass piece to auction off at Art Walk.

Once you've picked out your large piece you can decide how you want to proceed. If you don't want to do what I did that's fine. As long as all the kids participate whatever you decide to do is great!

I sectioned off the Plexiglas with leading tape and then each student wrote their name and decorated around it. They did this when they painted so we didn't need more class time. Some glasses replicated a FLW stained glass window, one glass painted a tree, another class did a peace sign, and another class made a desert scene.
